

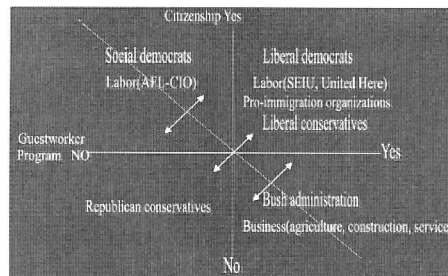
A POLITICAL GUIDE FOR DISGUISED TOURISTS
